Dear Music & Worship Arts Week Participants,

Welcome back to Lake Junaluska! For more than forty years we have been honored to host Music & Worship Arts week at our idyllic mountain setting.

We sincerely appreciate your prayers and support following Hurricane Helene's destructive path through this region. Throughout the storm, we were able to continue living fully into our mission to be a place of Christian hospitality through renewal of soul, mind, and body by supporting the emergency and recovery workers. The York Dining Commons served as the regional incident command center, and immediately following the storm, we offered our facilities to over 400 emergency and relief workers. We are deeply grateful for the opportunity to have supported them in their mission.

Unfortunately, we suffered more than \$1 million worth of damage to some of our most beloved structures. The entire downstairs of the Harrell Center, one of our most popular buildings, was flooded with over a foot of water. Our beloved Stuart Auditorium also sustained water damage, and the Rose Walk, one of our most iconic locations, experienced three significant landslides.

Most of the repairs to damaged areas have been completed, primarily funded by charitable donations. We are thrilled to be able to welcome you and others to these sacred grounds.

Thanks also for your prayers and support over the years. Your generous gifts strengthen this ministry and also help us maintain the grounds, historic buildings, and sacred spaces. Capital improvements since last year include a refresh to the Terrace Hotel dining room and the ground-level entrance. In addition, new TVs have been installed in all of the Terrace Hotel guest rooms.

Recently, Lake Junaluska enthusiastically announced a new \$14 million fundraising campaign called Sharing Our Gifts. This campaign – the most ambitious fundraising effort in many years – is mission-focused and highlights the following priorities:

- Sustaining the Annual Fund
- · Building youth and family housing
- Strengthening recreation ministry
- · Preserving the lake and dam
- · Restoring sacred spaces



Youth Talent Show Guidelines Completed Grade 6 /7 through completed Grade 12 Auditions: 2:30 - 3:30 Tuesday in Terrace Auditorium Show Time: 7:30 Tuesday evening, Stuart Auditorium

The Youth Talent Show for Middle and High School youth is a Music & Worship Arts Week tradition, open to students participating in either the Middle High or Senior High program. All groups or individuals must sign up for an audition time during check-in, immediately after worship on Tuesday, or via the QR code made available during the week. Only those groups or individuals will be admitted to Terrace Auditorium at the time of their audition. Check-in for auditions will be in the Elevator Lobby on the second floor of The Terrace, next to the Auditorium. Auditions will be held from 2:30 to 3:30 on Tuesday. In an effort to be fair to all and manage the length of the show, the following guidelines will apply:

Time limit for all acts: 3.5 minutes. Time limit will be strictly enforced.

Each youth may appear on the stage only once as a featured performer. They may appear as a soloist or as part of an ensemble, but not both. Exception: Youth who accompany another act.

No more than three (3) acts per church may audition.

Songs are to be accompanied (live or recorded) unless they are designed to be sung a cappella.

Carrie Chavarria


Visuals in Worship



Within that capacity, Mrs. Watkins-Rios developed the All-Saints Dance Academy at All-Saints Catholic School in Richmond, Virginia and began to work with the Highland Support Project Mayan Arts Program to develop a comprehensive dance program in Quetzalcantenango, Guatemala where children in the pueblos of Cantale and the township of "Chi-Chi" are taught classical techniques to enrich their native dance offerings.

In 2012, Ms. Watkins-Rios founded The Dance Candle Academy of Sacred and Performing Arts. Its mission is to combine the elegance, excellence, grace and artistry of technique with the heart, passion, conviction and soul of worship. In 2014, Ms. Watkins-Rios completed her 200-hour Karuna Yoga Teacher Training to assist her students and their families in working with a more holistic approach to movement and continue to integrate mindfulness and physicality. She continues to perform as a freelance artist, specializing in classical ballet, liturgical and worship, and yoga instruction.

Dr. Danny Frye is a highly accomplished music educator, conductor, and percussionist with over 25 years of experience teaching at both the high school and university levels.
